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## **A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE SANFORD LIONS CLUB**

The SANFORD LIONS CLUB was organized in 1935 with twenty charter members, who are now all deceased, and was sponsored by the Raleigh Lions Club.

Around 1938, the SANFORD LIONS CLUB started to sponsor a Lee County Agricultural Fair. Shortly after World War II, some of the far-sighted members of the club arranged for the SANFORD LIONS CLUB to buy land on Colon Road. Over the years, additional land was purchased and many buildings were erected on what is now "Sanford Lions Club Fair Grounds" property.

The SANFORD LIONS CLUB has sponsored the following clubs, some from which other clubs have been sponsored: Pittsboro 11/11/37, Apex 11/18/37, Biscoe 7/15/38, Siler City 4/28/38, Aberdeen 9/9/38, Broadway 8/15/50, Coats 2/28/72 and Western Harnett 1998. In 2005 a Day Time club was formed. A Leo Club was formed for high school age youth of Lee County in 2007.

“We Serve” is the slogan for all Lions Clubs throughout the world. The Sanford Lions Club is an active group that serves the citizens of Lee County and the surrounding areas. While a focus on servicing the blind and hearing impaired is first priority, the Lions Club also serves through various other projects including Vision Screening; Aids for the visual and hearing impaired; Scholarships; Facility Use; Charitable Grants; Special Recreational Opportunities; Boys and Girls Home Support; Christmas Cheer.

**ANTIQUE TRACTOR & WHEAT THRESHING EXHIBIT:** The Central Carolina Antique Power and Equipment Club (C-CAPE) will hold an Antique Tractor Exhibit Tuesday through Friday from 6:00 pm to 9:00pm, Saturday from 2:00 to 8:00pm and Sunday from 12:00pm-7:00pm. Antique farm machinery dating back to the early part of this century will be on display and in operation. The displays include: tractors from 1920s through 1960s; small one-cylinder engines from 1910s through 1930s; a Red River Special Thresher from the 1920s. The thresher will actually be threshing wheat. Don't miss the opportunity to see this old equipment in operation.

**LIVESTOCK SHOW AND CHAMPION AUCTION:** The Lee County Livestock Producers and the Sanford Lions Club will sponsor a Livestock Show Thursday evening at 7:00pm at the Arena Barn. **JR. MEAT GOAT SHOW:** The Lee County Regional Fair Junior Meat Goat Show is proud to be an exciting stop on the Farm Credit Circuit. Youth from sixteen neighboring counties are invited to participate. Goats will be weighed in starting at 4:00pm on Wednesday and the show will begin at 7:00pm. There will be two sets of confirmation classes, breeding does and wethers. Wether classes are broken down into light, medium and heavy weight market classes. Confirmation classes focus on the overall quality of the animal based on the breed standard. In addition to the confirmation classes, there will be showmanship classes as well. In showmanship the individual is judged on their ability to control and present their goat to bring out its best characteristics. Showmanship classes are divided up into four age groups of youth and one adult class.

# Lee Regional Fair Cook-Off Guidelines

## General Rules

- Cook-Off events are for amateurs only...no professionals.
- There are no categories for age groups for the Cake Bake-Off, Chili Cook-Off or Ice Cream Churn-Off. All contestants entering will compete against one another. There will be age divisions in the Mayor's Choice Cookie Bake-Off.
- Only one entry per participant per event.
- Exhibitor must be present to win.
- If any rules are not followed, contestant will be disqualified.

## Entering the Cook-Off:

- All entries must be registered and in place prior to the judging.
- After the judging begins, no other entries will be accepted.
- Bring entries to the Agricultural Exhibit Hall for registration.
- Entries can only be received on specified day and time listed under each Cook-Off event.
- There is no entry fee.
- Contestant with a Cook-Off entry will be admitted free to the Fair. Others must pay gate admission.

## Recipes

- Recipes are to be submitted with each entry and will become the property of the sponsors and may be used for the purpose of publicity, advertising, publishing, promotion, etc.
- Credit will be given to the person originating the recipe.
- Complete recipe for all events must be typed or clearly printed on an 8½ X 11 inch sheet of white paper. List all ingredients, exact measurement, all preparation steps and number of servings. Any recipe with raw eggs in the finished product will be disqualified. Recipe must be brought with entry on day of contest.
- Type or write name, address, email and telephone number on the reverse side of recipe in the upper right corner. Do not write exhibitor's information on the front of the recipe.
- If recipe is incomplete, entry will be disqualified.

## Judging

- Community and regional judges will be used for each Cook-Off. Judges' decision is final.
- Garnishes are permitted. Appearance is a factor in judging.
- Physical damage that may occur during transit or handling will not count against the contestant.
- Entries must be brought in appropriate sized container.
- Only judges and competition organizers are allowed in judging area.

## Winners:

- Prize money and certificates will be given out immediately following the contest.
- Pictures of the Cook-Off winners will be taken immediately following the contest and will be used to promote the Cook-Off.
- The winning entries will be served at the conclusion of the event. Other entries may be served also.

## Premiums

- The Sanford Lion's Club will provide ribbons and the following premiums: first place -\$100; second place - \$60; and third place - \$40 for the cake, chili and ice cream cook-off events. The Sanford Lion's Club will provide ribbons and the following premiums for each age division in the Mayor's Choice Cookie Bake-off: first place -\$50; second place - \$30; and third place - \$20.

## Food Safety

- If entry needs to be chilled or kept hot, bring in insulated container or small cooler. Entries will be disqualified if not protected properly in transport. Entry and container will be returned to contestant immediately following judging.

A minimum of 8 cookies should be arranged on a serving platter.

## **Cake Bake-Off**

To be held Wednesday, September 14, 2011. **Registration begins at 5:30 at the Agricultural Exhibit Hall Entrance.** Cakes will be judged on appearance, texture, and flavor. Recipe must be submitted as directed in the general rules. 10 points deducted if recipe is not submitted. Cakes made from scratch will earn 10 extra points

## **Chili Cook-Off**

To be held Thursday, September 15, 2011. **Registration begins at 5:30 at the Agricultural Exhibit Hall Entrance.** Chili will be judged on appearance, texture and taste. Temperature of chili at judging must read 140° F. Crock-pots are the preferred container. Recipe must be submitted as directed in the general rules. 10 points deducted if recipe is not submitted.

## **Ice Cream Churn-Off**

To be held Saturday, September 17, 2010. **Registration begins at 2:00 at the Agricultural Exhibit Hall Entrance.** Ice Cream will be judged on firmness, texture & taste. Recipe must be submitted as directed in the general rules. 10 points deducted if recipe is not submitted. No raw egg recipes allowed. Lion's will provide ice and electricity. The contestant must provide salt and all other items needed to produce the ice cream on site. Contestants will have 45 minutes to complete ice cream. Ice cream completed early will be judged.

## SECTION 1

### **EDUCATIONAL BOOTH EXHIBITS - AGRICULTURAL EXHIBIT HALL**

Educational exhibits should show something of the economic, social, physical and recreational growth and development of the rural and urban communities. These exhibits should be designed so that they can be judged unmanned. Booths must be reserved through North Carolina Cooperative Extension at 919-775-5624.

#### **BOOTH RULES AND REGULATIONS Lee Regional Fair-Agricultural Exhibit Hall**

1. Booths **MUST** have an educational message and not promote an organization.
2. Contact North Carolina Cooperative Extension, 2420 Tramway Road, Sanford at (919) 775-5624, to reserve a booth in the Agricultural Educational Exhibit Hall.
3. Booths may not be manned and selling of raffle tickets is not allowed.
4. Each of the twenty booths is similar in size and construction, having concrete floor, suspended acoustic ceiling with fluorescent lighting, wooden back wall panels and wooden side partitions. Dimensions are 6 feet wide, 8.5 feet high and 6 feet 8 inches deep.
5. 120 VAC outlets are located on the back wall approximately 19 inches from the floor at random intervals. A few booths will not have an outlet within the booth itself, but will share an outlet with an adjoining booth. This adjoining outlet will be within 1' of the partition and may be reached by running an extension cord under the partition.
6. Displays must not extend over the side partitions or into the aisle.
7. Displays may be fastened to the booth by mounting tape (masking, duct and double-sided tape will **NOT** hold all week), 1/4-inch staples, or small brads. No large nails or screws are permitted and nothing should be attached to the ceiling without first contacting the Exhibit Hall Manager.
8. All tools, supplies, tables, chairs, stepladders or any other equipment needed to construct the booth must be provided by the exhibitor.
9. Each group assigned a display booth must check-in with the Exhibit Hall Manager prior to set-up and provide the name and phone number of a person to contact in case of a problem.
10. Each display booth must remain intact in place for the duration of the fair.
11. Each display booth must be cleaned up at the time of teardown and all materials and debris must be removed from the premises. All tape, staples and other fasteners must be removed from the partitions and from the back wall.
12. Display booth set-up will be Thursday and Friday, September 8 and 9 from 12:00pm-7:00pm and Saturday, September 10 from 9:00am – 12:00pm. **Booths MAY NOT be set up on Sunday.** Judging will take place Monday, September 12<sup>th</sup>. Teardown and removal of all materials must be started and completed on Monday, September 19th from 3:00 - 7:00 p.m., NOT BEFORE.

- Does the exhibit instruct and teach?

**Creativity .....15 points**

- Are the props effective in delivering the theme?
- Are original ideas used?

**Attractiveness of Exhibit .....15 points**

- Do color, materials and props enhance the theme?
- Can written material be easily read?
- Are items neatly displayed and arranged?

2. Exhibitors must have trained and fitted the animals from August 15, 2011. Ownership by exhibitors is not required. However, in cases where exhibitors do not own the animal, a certificate of training and fitting from the owner is required at entry time.
3. If an exhibitor has more than one entry per class, another junior exhibitor must show the additional animals. Adults are not eligible to show.
4. Heifers must be halter broken.
5. All breeds will be shown in one class.
6. Classes will be divided based on age of heifer and will be announced on the day of the show.
7. Heifers will be shown Thursday, September 15th at 7:00 p.m.
8. Registration for JUNIOR BEEF HEIFER show is one week in advance of the show. Contact North Carolina Cooperative Extension at 919-775-5624 for the registration form.
9. A Grand Champion and Reserve Champion heifer will be picked from the class winner.
10. Take-in time, 4:00pm-6:00 pm.
11. If needed, Exhibitors should call Barn Manager, David Thomas, (919-776-7046) to reserve space for their cattle.

4. Exhibitors must have trained and fitted the steers from August 1, 2011.
5. Steers must weigh at least 800 pounds and can have two permanent teeth. All other teeth must be baby teeth and in place.
6. Steers must be halter broke and dehorned. Unruly animals, which may endanger the safety of the exhibitors, will be asked to leave the ring.
7. Each exhibitor is limited to two entries. If animals are in the same class, another junior must show his animal.
8. Registration for JUNIOR BEEF STEER show is one week in advance of the show. Contact North Carolina Cooperative Extension at 919-775-5624 for the registration form
9. Classes will be divided by steer weights (light, middle and heavy). A Grand and Reserve Champion will be selected from the class winners and will auction at the end of the cattle show. All other steers will receive market price (selected by show committee) and consignment add-on bids or may be taken home by the exhibitor.
